Better Standards of Care Em Wilkinson-Brice Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital



Em Wilkinson-Brice Introduced Michele Thornberry, Nurse Consultant for Safeguarding and Layla Price, Senior Learning Disabilities Liaison Nurse



She explained the 'Better Standards of Care' to the group and what that means for people with learning disabilities and autism.



NHS Improvement have worked with people who use health services and their families and people who work in health services



If we meet the standards it means they give a good quality service to people with learning disabilities or autism.





Standard 1. - Giving people their rights

All trusts must keep to the laws about:

- · Being fair to everyone
- Giving everyone their rights.

What NHS trusts need to do:



- Make sure that they do things properly when the law says they must lock people in their room (this is called seclusion)
- Make sure that people with learning disabilities or autism get the same quality services as other people.
- Show that they learn lessons from complaints and things that go wrong.
- Tell people with learning disabilities or autism about their rights in a way that they can understand.



Standard 2. - Involving people and listening to them

Every trust must make sure that people with learning disabilities or autism and their carers are helped to be involved in the care that they receive.







- What NHS trusts need to do:
- Involve people, families and carers in:
- Planning any treatment
- Thinking about how the care and treatment is going.
- Tell people if some things happen that shouldn't.
- Make sure staff know how to behave and communicate properly.
- Support people who have a complaint
- Involve people with learning disabilities or autism in choosing new staff
- Involve people with learning disabilities or autism in looking at how to improve services.



Standard 3. - Making sure we have the right staff with the right training.

All trusts should have the right staff with the right training to meet the needs of people with learning disabilities or autism.







What NHS trusts need to do:


- Understand the needs of people with learning disabilities or autism.
- Make sure they have enough staff who have had training in:
- Understanding people with learning disabilities or autism.
- Make sure they have enough staff who have had training in:
- The health issues of people with learning disabilities or autism.
- Supporting people who have problems with behaviour
- · Keeping people safe
- Peoples rights
- Have someone with the right knowledge, skills and experience to help other staff understand what people with learning disabilities or autism need.
- Have plans to cope if they can't get enough of the right staff



Group Work – We worked in groups to think about what is important to people with a learning disability when they visit the Royal Devon and Exeter hospital for an appointment or overnight stay.

My Goal – To have a paid job

Nicole's action:

 To visit the job centre in Bideford to ask for their help to get a job.
